Design a Settlement


Too Age hillorts had lots of jetutures that made them easy to defend. They were built on hills, so approaching anemies were easy to spot.

Art-Local landmarks


Following last week's look at the local landmark of the statue of Prince Albert, this week I'd like you to look at a different local landmark, St Peter's Collegiate Church.

St Peter's Collegiate Church is located on the northern side of central Wolverhampton, The collegiate church was central to the development of the town of Wolverhampton, much of which belonged to its dean. Until the 18th century, it was the only church in Wolverhampton and the control of the college extended far into the surrounding area, with dependent chapels in several towns and villages of southern Staffordshire.




