Differentiation:

Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Varied Fluency)

Developing Identify the adverb with the suffix —Iy that has been used in a sentence. Includes three multiple choice options.

Expected Identify the adverbs that have been used in a sentence. Includes an adverb with the suffix -ly and an adverb that is an exception to the rule. Includes six multiple choice options.

Greater Depth Identify all the adverbs in a short paragraph. Includes adverbs with the suffix -ly, —ily and exceptions to the rule. Includes ten multiple choice options.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Varied Fluency)

Developing Identify the adverb with the suffix –ly used in a sentence. Consider if the sentence would still make sense with an alternative adverb.

Expected Identify the adverb in a sentence which is an exception to the rule. Consider if the sentence would still make sense with an alternative adverb.

Greater Depth Identify all the adverbs in a short paragraph. Includes adverbs with the suffix -ily and exceptions to the rule. Consider if the sentence would still make sense with an alternative adverb.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Application and Reasoning)

Developing Recognise the adverb with the suffix —Iy used in a sentence and explain the meaning it has on the sentence.

Expected Recognise the adverb with the suffix —Iy used in a sentence and explain the meaning it has on the sentence.

Greater Depth Recognise the adverbs that have been used in a sentence and explain the meaning they have on the sentence. Includes adverbs with the suffix –ily and a common exception to this rule (fast, away, hard).

<u>Homework/Extension</u> Recognising Adverbs in Sentences

Developing

- 1. gently
- 2. The adverb 'loudly' should be underlined. Yes, the sentence would still make sense as it is still describing the movement of the door.
- 3. A, because the adverb 'quickly' suggests that Dan is rushing to put up his hood. Also, you would not expect someone to be wearing sunglasses and have their hood up.

Expected

- 4. often and eagerly.
- 5. The adverb 'fast' should be underlined. No, the sentence would not make sense as careful driving around a bendy road in the dark would be desirable.
- 6. B, because the adverb 'lightly' suggests that they are holding hands loosely so it is more likely that Shuri will let go of her Grandma's hand. You would only expect Shuri to have a sore hand if they had held hands with a tight grip.

Greater Depth

- 7. angrily; straight; steadily and rapidly
- 8. The adverbs 'busily', 'unhappily' and 'late' should all be underlined. Yes, the sentence would make sense as he wouldn't want to stand outside and be late for his lunch, but he had no choice.
- 9. B, because the adverb 'moodily' suggests that Debra is not feeling cheerful, therefore it is unlikely that she is enjoying watching her neighbours. The adverb 'hard' also suggests that Debra was unable to sleep which makes it more likely that she is unwell.
